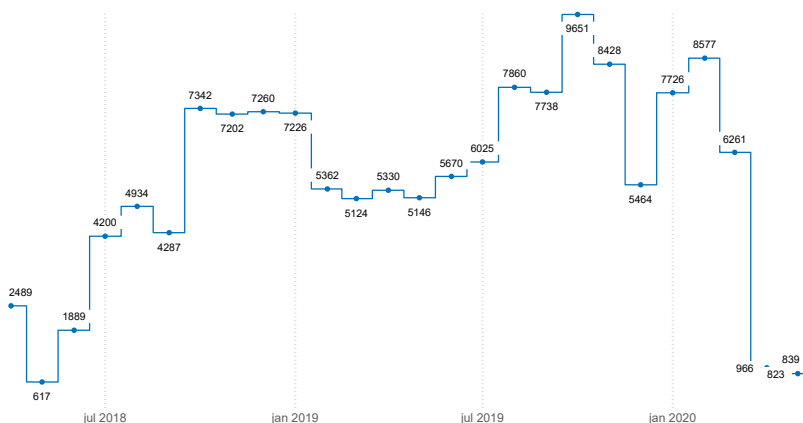
The COVID-19 emergence continues to impact the number of registrations made in Roraima by UNHCR, the UN Agency for Refugees, during the month of June. With the reduction of the flow in the Internalization and Triage Centers (PITRIGs, in Portuguese), the registration team has focused on supporting *Operação Acolhida* in the identification of urgent and more vulnerable cases.

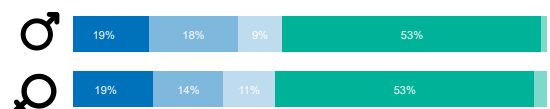


This chart shows the number of new monthly records for migrants and refugees in Progres v4 in historical perspective, starting in 2018.

# Sheltering

## COOPERATION

UNHCR provides support to the Ministry of Citizenship (MoC) in the temporary management of 13 sites and an emergency space, directly or indirectly through Civil Society partners in conjunction with the Ministry of Defense.

Through a cooperation agreement with the MoC, the [Voluntary Association for International Service \(AVSI\)](#), [Fraternity Without Borders](#) and the [International Fraternity \(FFHI\)](#), civil society organizations that are partners of UNHCR, do the **humanitarian management** of the shelters in collaboration with the [Armed Forces Logistics Task Force \(FT\)](#).

The FT provides **services related to infrastructure, security, health and dental care and food.**

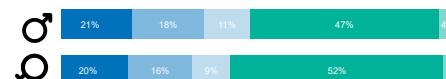
The [Seventh-day Adventist Church Humanitarian Agency \(ADRA\)](#) and the [Pirilampos Institute](#) (UNICEF partners) **carry out WASH (water, sanitation, and hygiene) and child protection activities** in several of the sites.

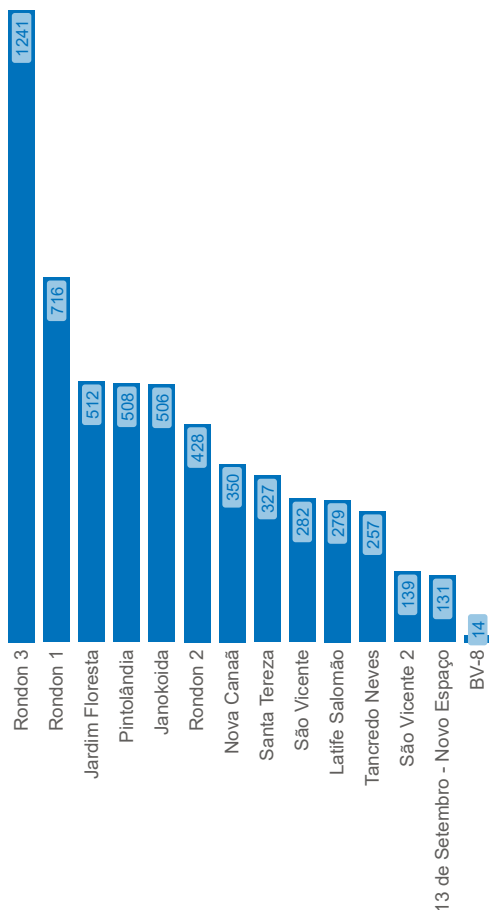

In recent months, there have been new dynamics regarding shelter sites. In response to the COVID-19 emergency, UNHCR and its partners, in coordination with the various actors of *Operação Acolhida*, have continued to implement prevention and monitoring measures. In addition, there has been an increase in the donation of hygiene kits and other non-food items. Actions such as the closing of the border between Brazil and Venezuela and the flow of people living in Spontaneous Occupations and on the streets, who decide to stay in these places, have resulted in a number of people sheltered below the monthly average of 6,000 people. Also, the fact that some shelter sites have taken in fewer people than their capacity entails has had impact on the numbers.

In addition, the month of June has seen the continuation of the actions to relocate people from the spontaneous occupation *Embratel* to the Emergency Space *13 de Setembro*, which is already operating with half of its capacity. The site will be included in the shelter sites' numbers, although it will not be categorized as such, as it is a temporary and emergency space, which is part of the Emergency Plan for Spontaneous Occupations of *Operação Acolhida*.

**POPULATION-PER-SITE**



The population-per-site chart contains data on persons with residence and refuge documentation, which are registered in the ProGres v4 system.

This month, the [Emergency Space 13 de Setembro](#) was added to the shelter statistics, although, as already mentioned, this is not a shelter. Its population was allocated to four houses that will be replaced by Refugee Housing Units (RHU).

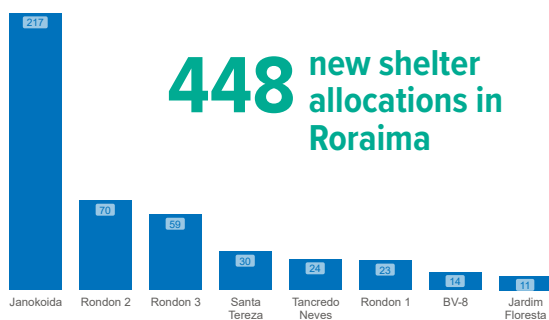
During this month, the statistics correspond only to what used to be houses one and two. Houses three and four are still in the process of relocation.

In response to the COVID-19 crisis, suspected or confirmed cases of contagion were transferred to the Protection and Care Area (APC) of [Operação Acolhida](#).

In addition, the BV-8 population figures do not include people from the *Janokoida* site, so their numbers have been reduced following the transition from an isolation area to a temporary shelter.

Finally, the data concerning the *São Vicente 2* site only shows the records previously made in the PITRIG and not the entire population present in the shelter.

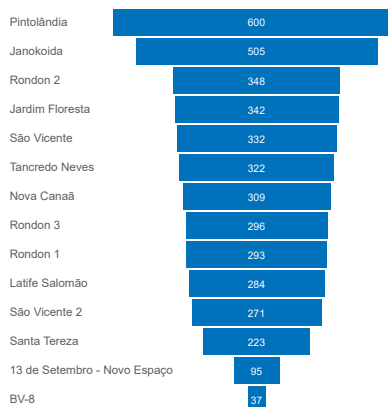
**SHELTER ALLOCATIONS (JUNE 2020)**



Every month, the shelter sites receive new flows. There are two modalities: [transfer between sites](#) and [new shelter allocation](#). In the following chart the two are counted together to represent this month's sheltering data for all Roraima sites.

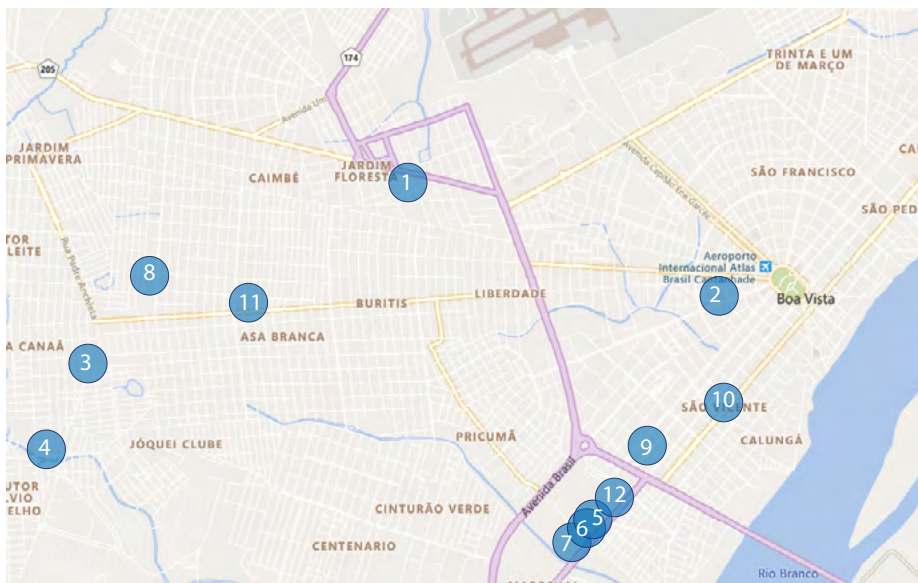
The values reported for the *Janokoida* site show the movement of Warao indigenous people who returned from BV-8, after a period of isolation in this transit center and, thus, do not consist of new admissions.

**AVERAGE LENGTH OF STAY (IN DAYS) PER SITE (JUNE 2020)**



315 days is the average length of stay in shelters. The shelter sites in Roraima provide temporary accommodation for refugees and migrants arriving in Brazil from Venezuela. Indigenous populations are allocated to the *Pintolândia* and *Janokoida* shelters. These groups face specific challenges to find lasting solutions, with an impact on their length of stay.

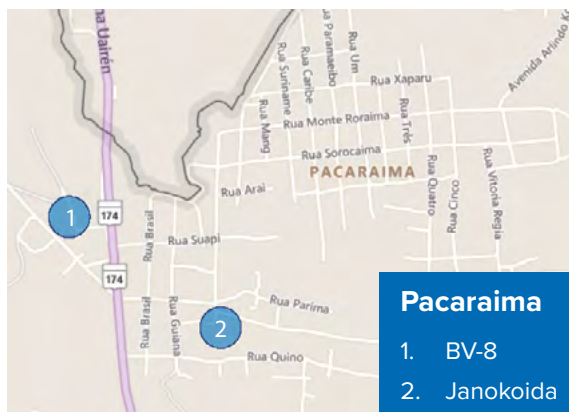

**GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE OF THE SITES**

Each shelter’s **Committee** is responsible for maintaining the shelter sites and performing specific tasks such as cleaning, food distribution, and the monitoring of health cases, among others. They are composed of members of the refugee and migrant shelter community itself. The members have several duties and responsibilities in the exercise of their functions, which favors community empowerment and participation.

**WORLD REFUGEE DAY**

To celebrate Refugee Day, on June 20th, UNHCR and partners AVSI, FFHI, FSF, SJMR and Canarinhos da Amazônia, organized several artistic activities, which involved children and young refugees and Venezuelan migrants. Paintings were made on the walls of shelters and the Emergency Space. The production of the video clip with the song “Eu canto” (“I sing”) from the Canarinhos da Amazônia project was published in the social networks and the voice of the children of the project accompanied the images showing the work routine in the shelter sites. About 2,300 children and adolescents received school bags from UNHCR, in preparation for their return to school. The artistic production in the sites with the theme “Meu futuro no Brasil” (“My Future in Brazil”) with poems, songs, paintings and drawings by children received special attention on the official UNHCR pages and national, regional and global social networks. In Roraima’s media, a special vignette was produced for the celebration by Radio Roraima and UNHCR exhibited their work for the Band Broadcaster.

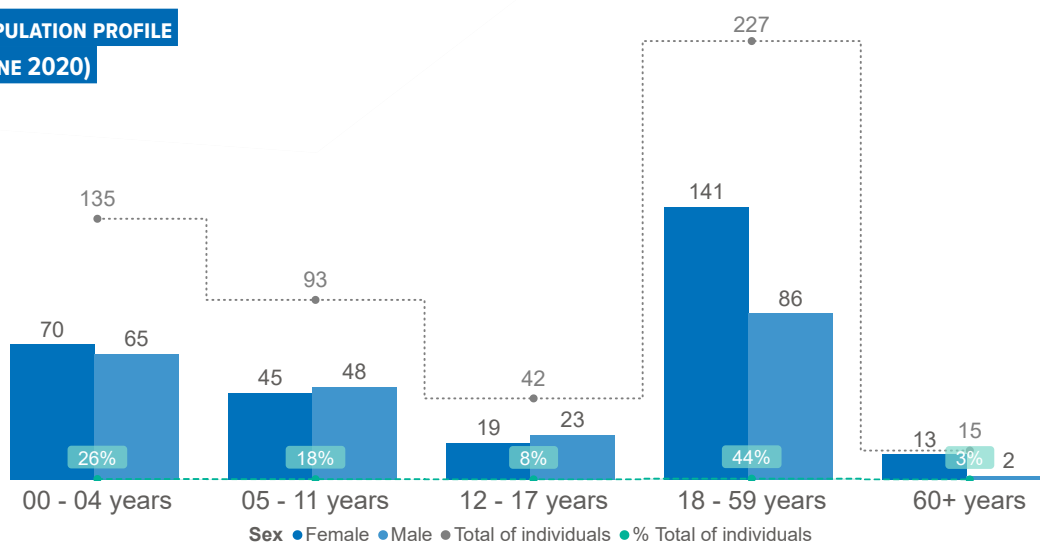

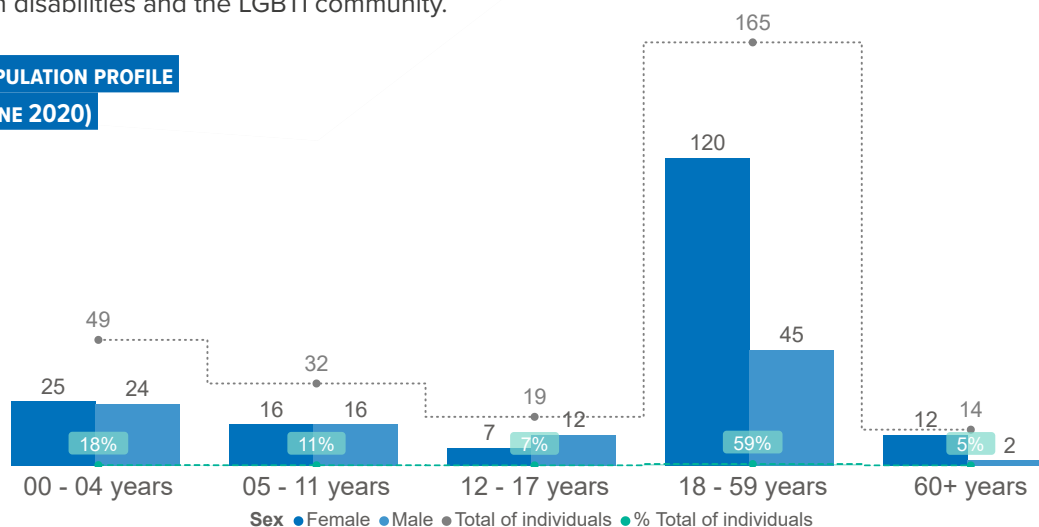

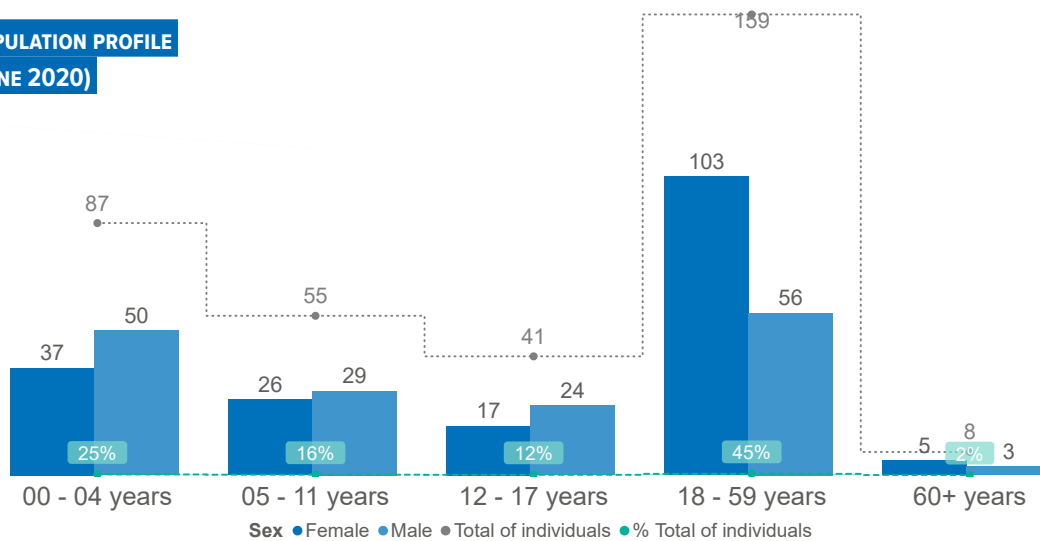

The space initially served the homeless indigenous refugee population and Venezuelan migrants and was a part of the first flow to arrive in Roraima in 2014. The site is almost entirely shared between the Warao and E'ñepá ethnic groups. The site has a mixed profile of men and women, with indigenous families divided into eight "aidamos" (Warao leaders) and one "ijan" (E'ñepa leader), who are responsible for each group.

### MAIN ACTIVITIES

- The 1st Exhibition “**Human Values: an indispensable practice**” was held between June 19, 20 and 22, 2020 for the community of Venezuelan refugees and migrants in celebration of the World Refugee Day. The exhibition was conceived and planned by Afonso Rodriguez, a 63-year-old economics graduate, and Carlos Diaz, a 64-year-old visual artist. In addition to these beneficiaries, the work relied on the collaboration of the site Rondon 3 (AVSI Brazil) Community Participation team, composed of Júlia Petek and Kátia Ramos, who provided all the necessary support for its execution.
- Also, in celebration of the Refugee Day, 551 UNHCR backpacks were distributed.
- **Super Panas:** 40 children and adolescents enrolled

The project was designed to foster the application and development of important concepts such as Human Values, which are vital to the sheltered community. The exhibition aimed to strengthen community life through the presentation of twelve human values considered the most important, divided into three days of activities.

Opened in May 2018, this site was initially designed to house the population of single men in Boa Vista. The profile changed twice: from October 2019, when the site became a living space to single men and couples, and in February 2020, when the site became a living space to families and couples. Initially managed by the Brazilian Army and later by the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), the current management has been in charge of AVSI since January 2020.

On May 11, 2020, UNHCR partnered with the NGO Fraternity Without Borders, in coordination with the Humanitarian Logistics Task Force, to inaugurate the new Emergency Space, with the goal of providing minimum humanitarian standards for people of UNHCR interest living in the Embratel Spontaneous Occupation. During the first and second phases of the project, UNHCR provided 30 Refugee Housing Units (RHUs) with solar lamps and mattresses. The transformation project plan consists of five phases designed to improve infrastructure and promote community participation.

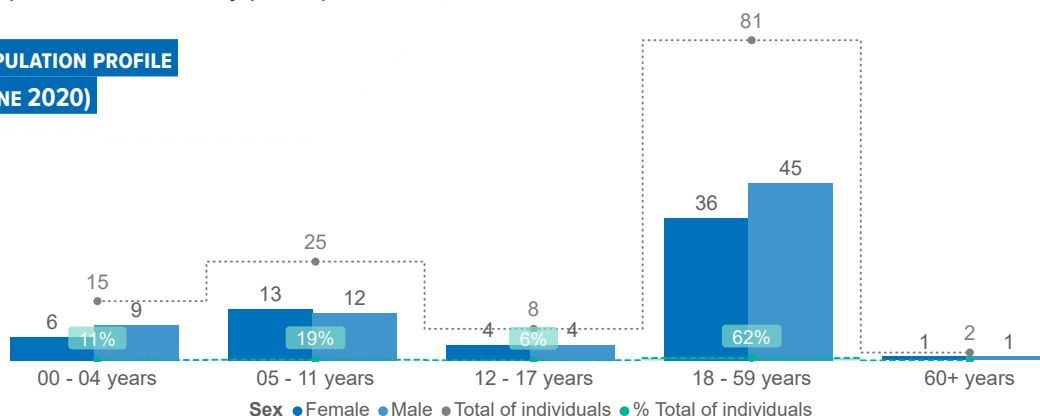

### GENERAL INFORMATION

In the Warao language, Janokoida means “Great House”. In this site, instead of the usual UNHCR Housing Units (RHU), there are hammock centers where the different groups organize themselves with their communities. The Warao indigenous families are grouped under leaders (called “aidamos”) responsible for each group. Warao families can be found in more than 19 states in Brazil.

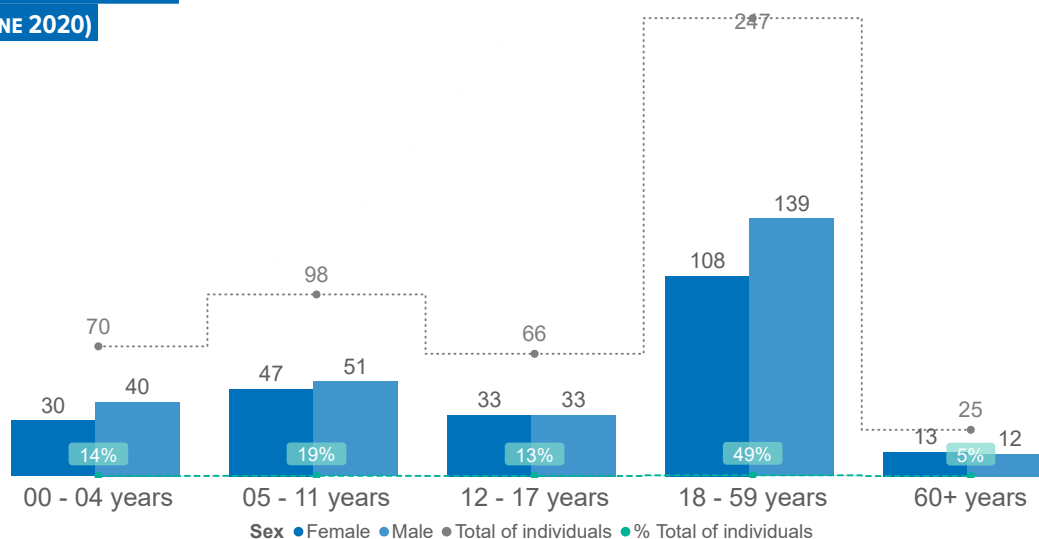

## MAIN ACTIVITIES

- Several different activities were carried out, such as painting; a hand hygiene demonstration session for children; a puzzle game called “playing with the Little Fish and Snack” - aiming to work on motor coordination, socialization skills and to strengthen bonds between the beneficiaries; an interview with the Tutelary Counselors of Pacaraima on “No to Child Labor” on the “Dibunoko Yakera” Radio; a skype meeting with Father Kokal on migration and Warao customs; making flags for Refugee Day with the support of, and to socialize with, the community; making posters with teenagers with the theme “My Future in Brazil” and a musical presentation of the Canarinhos da Amazônia. In celebration of the Refugee Day, 128 UNHCR backpacks were also distributed.

### GENERAL INFORMATION

This site is a transit accommodation with the following flows:

**Flow 1:** intended for people who have not completed their documentation settlement process or any other services available at the PITRIG, as well as people who have completed the process and are allowed to spend one night, before continuing to their destination the following day. Recommended number of people: up to 500

**Flows 2 and 3:** intended for vulnerable people to be transferred to shelters in Boa Vista (flow 2) and individuals granted permission to participate in the relocation process (flow 3). Recommended number of people: 500.

**Flow 4:** intended for vulnerable homeless persons who have not been part of any of the previous flows (arrival after closure of PRI and/or PITRIG; failure to access transport, etc.), provided they intend to apply for temporary residence or refuge. There is no recommended number of people, vacancies are for overnight stays, i.e. vacancies are allocated if there is availability within the total capacity of the accommodation center.

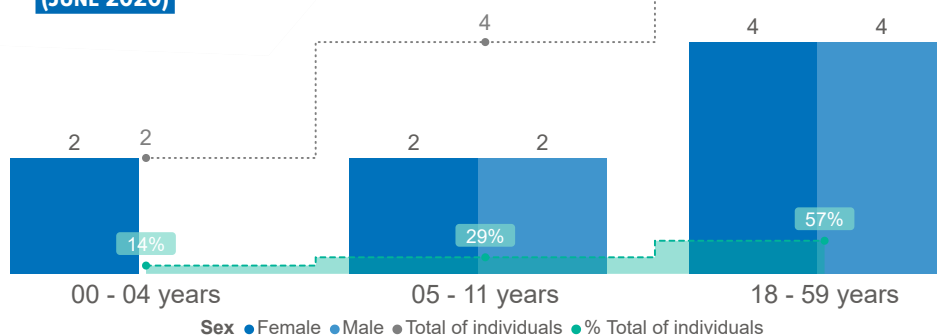

**Note:** Currently, there are no more indigenous people in BV-8 (the Janoko Jakera, which was used as an isolation place); all have returned to the Janokoida shelter. Thus, with 14 people already in wait, the relocation flow has been resumed.

### MAIN ACTIVITIES

- In June, a week was dedicated to the celebration of the Refugee Day, with poetry and other artistic activities. The Fraternity's management team handed out gift photos to the sheltered families and the *Canarinhos da Amazônia* gave a musical performance.

# Relocation

UNHCR continues to support the activities related to relocation even with the impact caused by the COVID-19 emergency. In addition, 437 cloth masks were distributed by UNHCR to people who were relocated in June, regardless of the modality. The masks were produced by the “Prevenção sem Fronteiras” project, a partnership between UNHCR and the Jesuit Service for Migrants and Refugees (SJMR) of Boa Vista, which includes refugees, migrants and Brazilians in the making of the virus prevention items for Venezuelans and Brazilians in vulnerable situations.

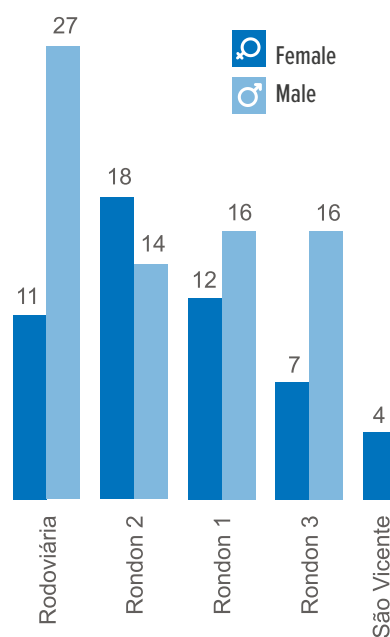

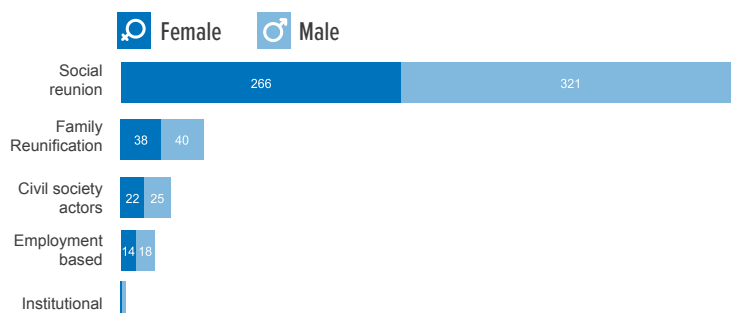
## FITNESS FOR TRAVEL (FFT)

FFTs are indispensable relocation actions to carry out medical screenings and documentation checks of the beneficiaries which will be relocated in the different modalities. UNHCR monitors the FFT activity by supporting the registration of the selected beneficiaries in the proGresV4 database, using the individual registration module or reception entity.

## AMOUNT PER SHELTER, SCREENING CENTER AND SPONTANEOUS OCCUPATIONS (TOP 5)

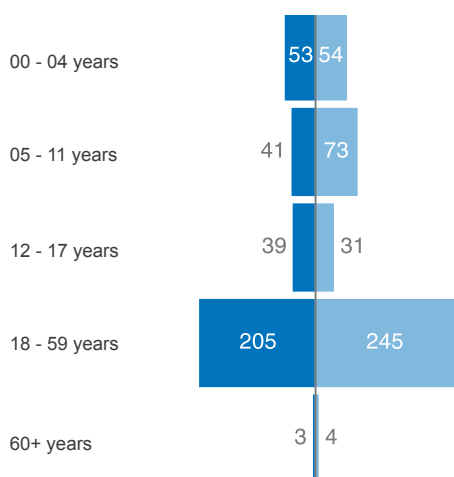


## AMOUNT BY MODALITY OF THE RELOCATION PROCESS

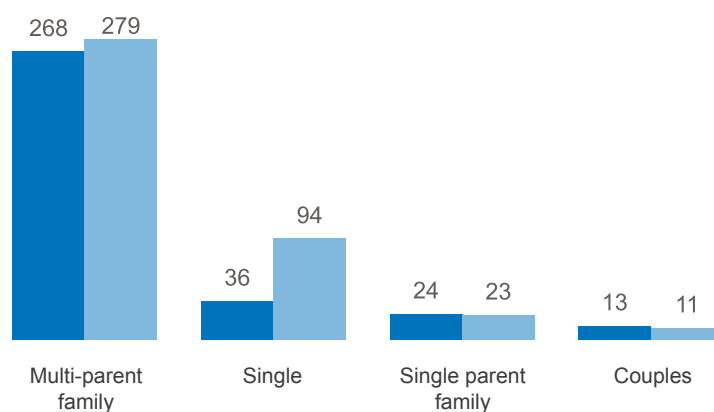




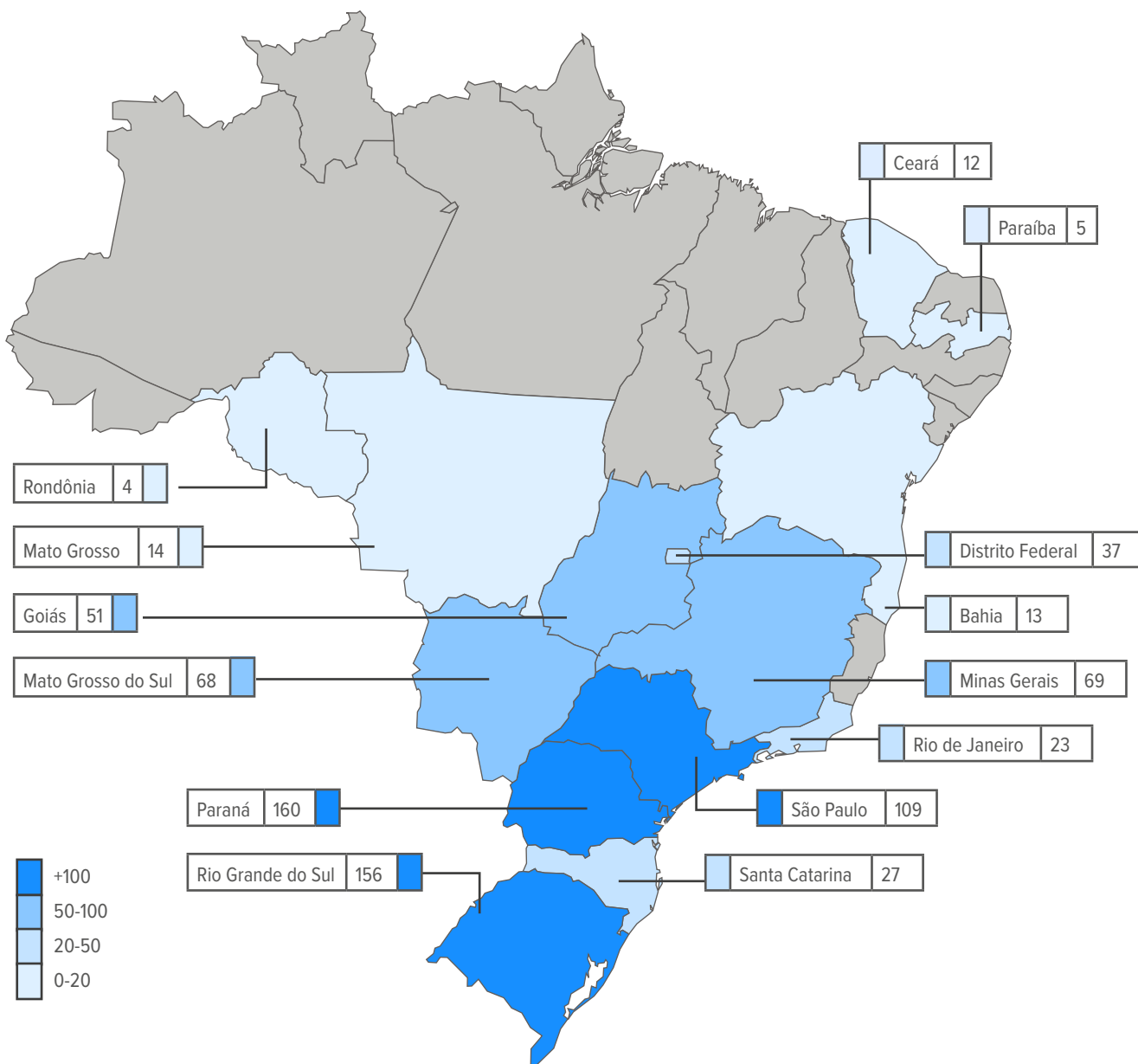

# Rondon 2 Relocation

## RONDON 2

The Relocation Center **Rondon 2** shelters Venezuelans who have expressed a particular interest in the shelter-shelter modality (led by UNHCR), as well as those who have a relocation process in other modalities (led by IOM and / or FT Log Hum) where it was identified that there is a need for shelter before boarding. After identifying these beneficiaries, they are relocated to Rondon 2.

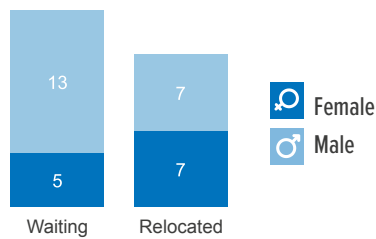
Once they are at the Relocation Center, beneficiaries are accompanied by the management staff from the shelter (AVSI partner of UNHCR) that performs activities focused on the integration process, such as information sessions on rights and duties, insertion in the labor market, as well as guidance on how to access the school and / or health legal services.

Since the onset of the pandemic, there has been a temporary suspension of people relocated in the UNHCR-led site-to-site shelter allocation modality. This modality had to be adjusted to the restrictive measures adopted in other states, resulting in fewer people relocated to flow 1 of the Rondon 2 Relocation Center.

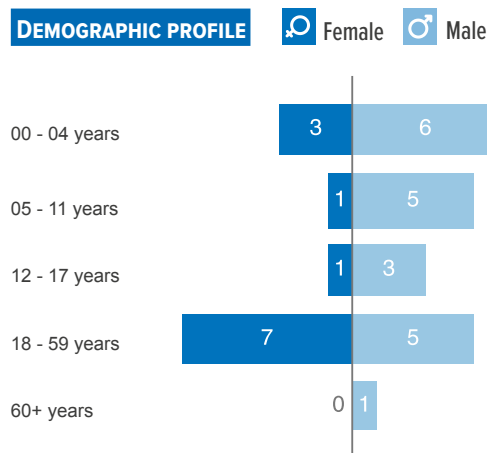
To a lesser extent, the situation also affected the other modalities, thus influencing the reallocations to flow 2.

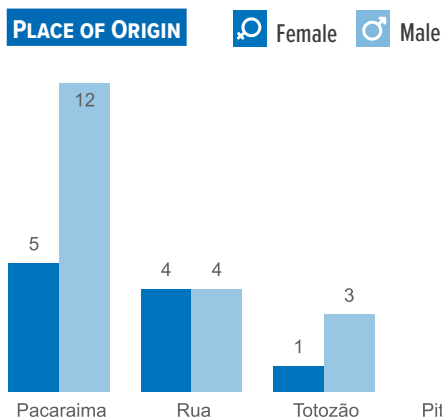
### STATUS ON RONDON 2



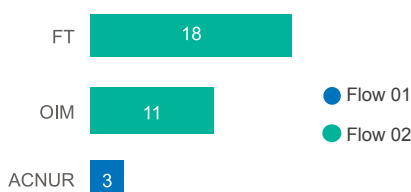
### DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE



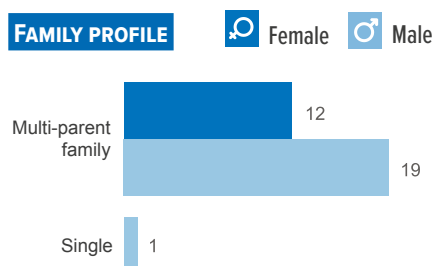
### PLACE OF ORIGIN
