Individual: Collection of biometric data, protection needs and individualized details related to UNHCR actions for each family member.

Family Entity: Collection of data referring to the household as a whole. Used for population monitoring purposes.

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Sheltering

S COOPERATION

Shelters are one of the actions promoted by Operação Acolhida developed by the Brazilian Government. The UNHCR provides support to the Ministry of Citizenship (MdC) in the management of 13 temporary shelters and 1 Emergency Space, and with the management of Protection Cases and people with specific needs via the Association of Volunteers in International Service (AVSI), the 'Fraternidade' – International Humanitarian Federation (FFHI and the Fraternity Without Borders (FSF) organization, in partnership with the Ministry of Defense (MD) and under the Coordination of the Federal Sheltering Sub-committee.

> The Task Force (TF) provides **services related to infrastructure, safety, health, dental care and food.**

The Humanitarian Agency of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church (ADRA) and the Pirilampos Institute **develop WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) and child protection activities in several shelters.** IN SEPTEMBER (2020)

The number of new arrivals has considerably decreased due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the closing of the borders. Thus, the Federal Government proposed a Plan to Reallocate Sheltered Persons in five shelters (Jardim Foresta, Nova Canaã, Tancredo Neves, Latife Salomão and Santa Tereza) with the aim of improving the living conditions, the services, and the level of protection offered in all shelters. The government also decided to open a new shelter by the name of "*Pricumã*", to receive the rest of the population who still needed to be sheltered, while, at the same time, maintaining dignified living conditions.






The UNHCR and its partners were called upon to support the reallocation and reorganization of the population in an efficient, participatory and safe manner considering each individual's profile. The UNHCR and its partners coordinated with the TF and carried out assemblies and focus group discussions to inform people during this activity and to strengthen the Interiorization Strategy, since living in a shelter is viewed as temporary and a last resort. The Jardim Floresta shelter had already been closed by the end of this reporting period and the Pricumã shelter hosted 87 people. The rest of the Jardim Floresta former occupants was reallocated to other shelters such as São Vicente 1, Rondon 2 and São Vicente 2, based on each person's profile. The reallocation exercise is being implemented by the Operação Acolhida Task Force, the UNHCR and its Partners; the Pricumã shelter is managed by AVSI, a UNHCR partner. Shelters such as Rondon 1, Rondon 2, Rondon 3, Pintolândia, São Vicente 1, São Vicente 2, Pricumã and the Emergency Space should continue to shelter and support the vulnerable population in 2020.

GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE IN THE SHELTERS

In order for the shelters to be maintained in an efficient and continuous manner, specific activities like cleaning, food distribution, health monitoring (among others) are carried out by **Committees** (made up of members of the refugee and migrant community). These committees are supervised by the shelter Management team.

Committee members have various responsibilities in the exercise of these activities, thus favoring community empowerment and participation.

AVERAGE LENGTH OF STAY IN THE SHELTERS (IN DAYS) (SEPTEMBER) 2020)




The Roraima shelters are intended to serve for the temporary hosting of refugees and migrants arriving in Brazil from Venezuela.

The average stay in the shelters is 243 DAYS. UNHCR is currently working to reduce average stay in an effort to promote the integration of refugees and migrants.

The average stay in Indigenous Shelters even higher, at 432 DAYS. These groups face greater specific challenges in finding lasting solutions, thus impacting the length of their stay.

SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND PREVENTION OF GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE



Several meetings were held during this month to discuss and raise-awareness on issues related to sexual and reproductive health, as part of an initiative spearheaded by the UNHCR, in partnership with AVSI, and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). At the first meeting, both men and women participated together in an educational activity to discuss taboos, myths and doubts related to sexuality and preventive health. The groups were then divided by gender (male and female) and

became safe spaces for further discussion on topics such as gender-based violence, prevention of Sexually transmitted infections (STIs), unplanned pregnancy, and menstrual hygiene. The latter theme was accompanied by the distribution of menstrual cups and an extensive discussion about them, since most of the women had never heard of them before. Meanwhile, a group of men was also formed to address issues such as new masculinities, self-care, and sexual and reproductive health.
