Colombia hosts 2.48 million refugees and migrants from Venezuela, more than any other country. The reopening of official border crossings in 2022 facilitated onward movements and additional inflows of refugees and migrants from Venezuela and from other countries. Irregular arrivals are expected to continue, in parallel with onward movements towards Central and North America. Pendular movements between Colombia and Venezuela also remain frequent.

The RMNA highlighted a continuation of humanitarian needs for the intransit and pendular populations. Ninety-two per cent of those surveyed in-transit report having no resources for their journey; 51 per cent are severely food insecure, 69 per cent face difficulties accessing drinking water. Those engaging in pendular movements enter Colombia mainly to access food, healthcare, medicines and livelihoods

For refugees and migrants indestination, multiple socio-economic challenges persist. Eighty-two per cent of households live in inadequate housing conditions, 51 per cent eat two meals a day or less, 92 per cent have insufficient or intermittent access to water and only 48 per cent of children attend school. Meanwhile, 52 per cent earn less than the minimum wage, 19 per cent are unemployed and 24 per cent of households resort to risky activities as a negative coping mechanism. Existing services in some territories are insufficient due to the increase of the population in need.

RESPONSE PRIORITIES

The RMRP 2023–2024 contains a comprehensive response in 31 of Colombia's 32 departments, implemented through 74 R4V partners. Priority will be given to departments on the country's borders with Venezuela, Ecuador and Panama, as well as cities and territories with a high proportion of refugees and migrants in rural and remote areas.

In line with government priorities, R4V partners will support the State's response with complementary programmes funded through bilateral cooperation, particularly in the area of medium to longer-term socioeconomic inclusion of refugees and migrants from Venezuela in their host communities, consistent with R4V's commitment to the Humanitarian-Development-Peace Nexus. The overall aim is to ensure refugees' and migrants' effective access to rights, goods and services, advancing the generation of sustainable livelihoods, jobs and entrepreneurship opportunities, and promoting harmonious relations with host communities.

Humanitarian assistance will be provided through direct assistance. These interventions will target the most vulnerable, such as those in-transit¹ on foot ('caminantes'), refugees and migrants who recently arrived or who live in informal settlements, indigenous populations, persons with specific protection needs and those who cannot access the country's Temporary Protection Status or asylum procedures, and therefore cannot benefit from social protection schemes.

Protection and PSEA are central in all activities under this Plan. As such, partners will support and strengthen mechanisms to identify, refer and assist vulnerable cases and profiles.

In Colombia, the R4V response will also include refugees and migrants of other nationalities (in addition to Venezuelans).
