

Protection indicators and activities guideline for regional monitoring

Introduction

The Regional Protection Sector, with the objective of strengthening coordination and information management capacities for Protection platforms and sectors, and advocating compliance with protection standards for proper coordination and information management, reviewed the response indicators for the period 2025-2026. In this review, some indicators were rephrased and adjusted to better reflect activities among other R4V Sectors and Working Groups, as well as protection activities.

Within the regional monitoring framework for the R4V humanitarian response, the objectives and sectoral indicators are key for the analysis and reporting processes of response activities carried out. A correct activity reporting process is essential for the follow-up and definition of strategies of the national sectors. For this reason, the reporting process conducted by sector organizations must consider not only the use of the platform, but also the understanding of the indicators and their proper reporting in relation to the associated activities. This guide presents the links among the sectoral results objectives, indicators and a list of suggested associated activities.

<p># of refugees and migrants who participated in community-based protection activities</p>	<p>Community-based activities involve refugees and migrants, as well as members of the community and they are activities intended to empower them to participate in and take greater ownership of their own protection, reduce stigma and promote peaceful coexistence. This can include establishment of or support to community groups, who will participate in the identification and mitigation of protection risks in their communities. Partners are encouraged to support existing community groups, but if there are no existing community groups in a particular location, new ones can be established.</p>
<p># of people reached through informational or awareness/sensitization activities</p> <p>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</p>	<p>Awareness raising activities (joint or stand-alone)</p> <p>Campaigns</p> <p>This indicator includes all awareness raising activities for refugees and migrants with respect to their rights, entitlements and/or the availability of humanitarian/government and other services. Awareness raising can be delivered either to groups of individuals, or one-on-one to an individual. The indicator also includes campaigns; however, please count the number of individuals reached through a campaign, not the number of campaigns conducted. If the campaign is conducted via social medias, please count the number of people by relying on visualizations eg, on</p>

# produced and disseminated advocacy products <i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i>	<p>This indicator includes advocacy products, public statements, reports, infographics aimed at securing access to rights (e.g. not to be rejected at border, no devolution, the right to seek and be granted asylum, access to national protection mechanisms, etc.), which have been created and disseminated.</p>
# of refugees, migrants, and host community members trained <i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i>	<p>This indicator encompasses all trainings, capacity building initiatives, webinars and technical sessions on protection approaches and standards, human rights, etc., with the participation of refugees, migrants and host community members (including ethnic groups organisations work with and for). The trainings aim to strengthen technical capacity and consolidate the protection environment (to promote access to documentation, rights and basic services, etc.). Count the sum of number of people trained.</p>
# of humanitarian and development workers/civil society actors trained <i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i>	<p>This indicator encompasses all trainings, capacity building initiatives, webinars and technical sessions with the participation of local, national and regional NGOs/CSOs and development actors, whose objective is to strengthen technical capacity and consolidate the protection environment (to promote access to documentation, rights and basic services, including access to national protection mechanisms). It also covers all initiatives related to support and contribute to building asylum/migration capacities, as well as for the identification of international protection needs, coordination and referrals to asylum and migration authorities.</p> <p>The indicator covers all initiatives related to support and contribute to the development of capacities to sector strengthening.</p>
# of other individuals trained (such as private sector workers) <i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i>	<p>This indicator encompasses all trainings, capacity building initiatives, webinars and technical sessions on protection approaches and standards, human rights, etc., with the participation of individuals who are not covered by other indicators (for instance, private sector workers). The trainings aim to strengthen technical capacity and consolidate the protection environment (to promote access to documentation, rights and basic services, etc.).</p>

<p># of Government employees trained</p> <p><i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i></p>	<p>This indicator encompasses all trainings, capacity building initiatives, webinars and technical sessions with the participation of local, national and regional government individuals (e.g. law enforcement officials, military personnel, migration officials, RSD officials, judges, public defenders, ombudspersons, civil registrars), whose objective is to strengthen technical capacity and consolidate the protection environment. It also covers all initiatives related to support and contribute to building asylum/migration capacities as well as for the identification of international protection needs, coordination and referrals to and among asylum and migration authorities.</p>
<p># of multilateral or interagency events held (incl. meetings on advocacy, policy or coordination)</p> <p><i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i></p>	<p>This indicator helps us gauge the R4V engagement in advocacy and policy-making processes. It reflects our active participation in meetings and events that aim to advocate policies and coordinate efforts.</p>
<p># of public policies and programs supported</p> <p><i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i></p>	<p>This indicator shows R4V's contribution to support and/or advocate for <u>public</u> (intended as Government sponsored or led) protection policies and programs that benefit refugees and migrants, as well as their host communities.</p>
<p># of guidelines, standards and tools developed to support and strengthen the response</p> <p><i>*(standard indicator across other sectors as well)</i></p>	<p>This indicator includes the development of structured frameworks, protocols, development of guidelines, standards, and tools as well as instruments aimed at enhancing the effectiveness and efficiency of the response.</p>
