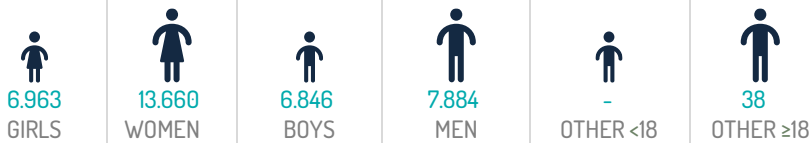

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- On **September 6<sup>th</sup>**, the R4V Regional Platform published the 2024 Refugee and Migrant Needs Analysis (RMNA). The Chile chapter includes key findings for people with a vocation to remain in the country, based on primary data (collected between April and May 2024) and available secondary sources.
- Between **September 9 and 22<sup>nd</sup>**, the National Platform carried out various activities around the planning of the fifth response plan (sixth regional) for 2025-2026. Eighteen partners submitted their prioritization of activities to address the needs of migrants and refugees over the next two years.

## NATIONAL OVERVIEW

- In **September**, the Automated Biometric Identification System (ABIS), initially implemented in Arica y Parinacota region, was expanded to the Antofagasta and Tarapacá. ABIS allows for mass biometric comparisons by matching fingerprints, faces, voices, and irises with police databases. Additionally, the launch of other border control systems was announced, including increased public force equipment and the use of technology for identification and geographic mapping at the border.
- On **September 23<sup>rd</sup>**, Chile approved the Pact for the Future, an agreement aimed at transforming global governance to address 21st-century challenges, including migration governance and addressing the root causes of forced displacement. The pact seeks to adapt international institutions to changing environments and ensure they can fulfill their commitments in a dramatically evolving geopolitical, economic, and technological context.
- On **September 25<sup>th</sup>**, the Administrative Service for Identification, Migration, and Foreigners of Venezuela confirmed that foreigners processing their passports abroad through consulates that closed on July 29 must collect them at the main office of this service in Caracas.
- Between **September 28 and 29<sup>th</sup>**, Venezuela suspended commercial flights to Chile. With this measure, Venezuela has reduced its global connectivity by 54%, according to the president of the Association of Airlines in Venezuela.

## PARTNERS RESPONSE

- SHELTER:** During the month, assistance was provided to 412 migrants and refugees across nine regions of the country, focusing on housing alternatives for the most vulnerable groups. Families received rental subsidies, primarily benefiting women, girls, boys, and youth, helping secure transitional accommodations and reduce vulnerability. Additionally, 95 refugees and migrants received emergency housing support to immediately address critical needs.
- INTEGRATION:** Various initiatives were implemented to enhance employment opportunities and well-being for 481 refugees and migrants, primarily in the Metropolitan Region. These included training on the labor market and job search techniques. Employability was also promoted through vocational courses like hairdressing, support for entrepreneurship, access to digital markets, and community dining spaces that support food-related businesses. Seed capital (CBI) was provided to initiate or strengthen business ideas. Finally, civil society organizations and businesses received training on organizational processes, project management, and inclusive practices for people in human mobility.

## SITUATION REPORT

- **EDUCATION:** To ensure educational access for migrant and refugee children and youth, platform partners provided technical support to boost the Ministry of Education’s Foreign Students Technical Roundtable, with participation from 38 students in the Metropolitan Region, advancing the implementation of the Policy for Foreign Children and Youth Students.
- **HEALTH:** Platform partners worked to support the migrant and refugee population in the health sector, reaching 79 people in the Metropolitan, Valparaíso, and Tarapacá regions. This included assistance for inclusion in the public health system and online psychological services.
- **PROTECTION:** A total of 1,553 refugees and migrants in 11 regions received assistance with digital procedures and regularization processes, along with information and case referrals. Accompaniment and awareness-raising sessions on human mobility and rights were held, including talks and recreational activities for migrants and refugees, as well as training for municipal staff. Additionally, 610 children participated in emotional support spaces. And a human trafficking training session was conducted at the Biobío Regional Anti-Trafficking Roundtable.
- **WASH:** Hygiene kits for personal, family, and children’s were provided to 26 migrants and refugees in Coquimbo, Antofagasta, and Tarapacá.
- **FOOD SECURITY:** Food assistance was provided to 52 migrants and refugees in Coquimbo and Tarapacá through individual and family kits. Support was also provided to those in temporary housing to ensure food security.

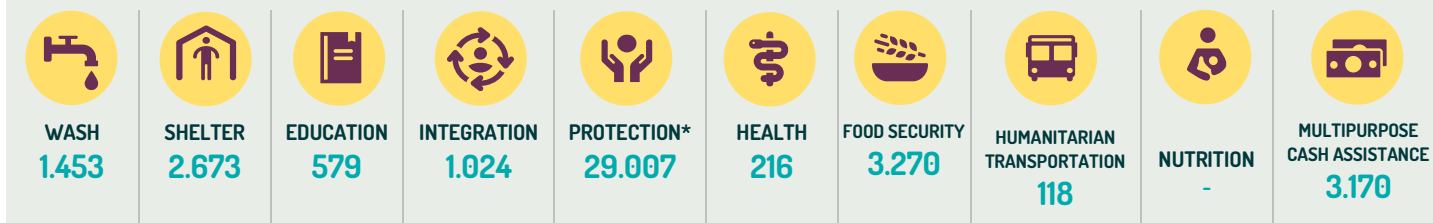
## PACT FOR THE FUTURE
